The 2010 Ethnic Minority British Election Survey (EMBS) is the most comprehensive study ever undertaken in Britain of the political concerns, orientations, voting patterns and integration of ethnic minorities in the political process.

The study was funded by the ESRC and the fieldwork was conducted, using the highest standards, by TNS-BMRB. It was directed by Anthony Heath, Stephen Fisher, Gemma Rosenblatt, David Sanders and Maria Sobolewska, who will be reporting the main results.
